

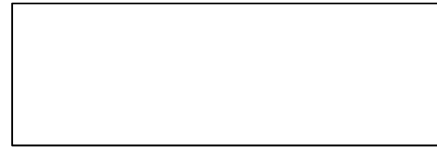

"It was in Antioch that the disciples were first called 'Christians'" (Acts 11:26)

The word Christian is probably one of the most recognized words in the English language. Millions of people around the world have claimed that name as followers of Jesus Christ. If so, then go ahead, and say it with complete boldness and confidence, I AM A CHRISTIAN!

Restoration 2

I will restore to you the years that the swarming locust has eaten [Joel 2:25](#)

Because this is my word for the year, we're going to have another lesson in *Restoration*. Have you ever seen anybody restore an old car or truck where it was gutted and stripped down to the bare bones?

My first car was a beautiful '67 Camaro, baby blue with white racing stripes. Eventually the back fender started to rust. The interior deteriorated and became cracked and torn. So I decided to pay a man to restore it.

Off came the fenders, out popped the interior. He basically gutted it and started from scratch. He cut out the rust and welded in a new panel. The paint was stripped down to the bare metal. Body filler was applied then sanded. Then it was primed with an epoxy primer. A new coat of paint was sprayed over the entire car. Then a clear coat finish was applied to protect the paint and make it gleam.

Redoing the interior consisted of removing all seats then reupholstering them.

That car cost me a lot of money. I even had to have a rebuilt engine installed at one point (This is a whole other kind of lesson). When I bought the car at 19, it had a few quirks. My sister, cousin, friend, and I wanted to drive it to Ocean City (that's a whole other story), but my dad advised me not to drive it that far until he had someone look at the engine. I have little patience and sometimes I want what I want so.....I didn't listen to good old Dad, and it was a big mistake.

Aside from a slew of other issues we encountered on our little excursion, we broke down on the way home. The car just stopped going. Petal to the floor and it was puttering along until it just stopped. We had to be towed home, and after months and months of being without a car, I finally found someone to rebuild the motor.

Sometimes, just like that old car, we wear out. How do we get so battered and broken? Life, my friends. Sometimes through our own poor choices and sometimes by situations we have no control over. Sometimes it hits you unexpectedly like a ton of bricks. Other times, it's a gradual downward spiral.

Sometimes, it calls for rewiring the system and even rebuilding the engine. We can become so beaten up, battered, cracked, and broken that we need restoration.

A friend of mine once said to me, regarding the loss of her son and other family members soon after, "It's like a puzzle with a piece missing. It's not the same anymore." How well I know that feeling. A missing piece of the puzzle changes the entire scene. There's an empty space. A hole. One missing piece changes the dynamics of the picture.

So this is the new normal. Don't you hate that phrase? I do! I want my life back the way it was. I want my person back. The loss is significant. It changes our lives. Our puzzle pieces don't fit anymore.

During that conversation, my friend and I discussed moving forward. Embracing the good we have now in front of us. To discover who we are and who we can be without that piece. A piece that will always be a part of us, but is no longer front and center.

We need restoration. We've been battered, bruised, dented, tattered, and torn. But like that heap in the junk pile that someone casually discarded, we are capable of being restored. We may not be the same after the new upholstery has been installed, even if it is made to look like the original. We may need a paint job, something pretty, glossy, and new. We may have new shiny bumpers. But that is all on the outside. What's inside is what's important. Internally, God may give us a new or rebuilt motor. The motor is what drives us.

Are you in need of repair and restoration? You've come to the right place.

God offers redemption, hope, and a positive outcome. He promises restoration. He promises that the rebellious years will not be wasted but redeemed.

The restoration is the new you. You can be put back together better than the shape you were in.

God will restore you.

Maybe some can relate better to a total knee replacement. Your knee wasn't functioning like it should, bone on bone, the pain getting worse. You're finally a candidate for knee surgery. Sounds great, right? A new knee. A new you. No more pain.

First the knee is replaced, and that in itself is quite an ordeal. A 6-to-10-inch incision is made over the knee joint. The damaged cartilage and bone are removed. Implants of metal and plastic are placed to restore the joint mobility. The incision is stitched back together. Then the restoration takes place. First, the pain, the agony, the healing, and learning to walk again. The frustration of being incapacitated and relying on others. Learning to use those muscles again. *The healing must take place first before the restoration can begin.*

When we're going to through the process of restoration, there may be pain, lots of it. Mentally, spiritually, emotionally, and sometimes physically as we experience the loss of what we once knew. Then there is healing. Healing takes time, work, hard work, and perseverance. But oh, what a payoff in the end.

No, things may never be the same again, but here is where your internal restoration begins, returns you to God, and brings you to a higher level of glory. During the healing process, you learn to depend on God more and more for everything. We learn how to surrender it all to God. And when we find ourselves trying to stand on our own two feet again without His help, we learn to surrender it all over again and keep surrendering it. On the other side of pain, we may know Him deeper, more intimately than ever before, as we exercise and grow those faith muscles. During the restoration, we learn to know who we are again, and who we have the power to become. We learn to know ourselves. And part of knowing who we are, is knowing that we are children of God. The sons and daughters of the Most High King. Saved by the blood of Christ.

If you have suffered a loss or just need to let go of something you are holding onto, or just need a tune-up, surrender it now to God. Let Him restore you to who He wants you to be. Let Him take the wheel. The Potter's wheel will shape you, refine you, renew, and restore you.

Even broken relationships can be restored if God is at the helm. He can restore anything. With His guidance, and equal effort on your part, He can restore what was once broken and make it better than new, all for His glory!

Sometimes we need to come to the end of life as we knew it. Sometimes we need to come to end of ourselves. Sometimes, it's us that needs to be restored. Someone we love passed away. Someone we loved walked away. That piece of the puzzle is forever missing. But God can and will restore us, if we let Him.

God will chip away at the bad stuff in us and restore us to Him. He is restoring us from that junked heap that has been cast aside into something beautiful. A beautiful wreck. We are all broken in some way, shape, or form. Let's be broken together, and let Him restore us to wholeness, newness, recreate us and our lives in this new season.

Reassembled. Restored. Repaired. That's what we are when we give our lives to the Lord. He will reset us, rewire us, restructure us. His mercies are new every morning (Lamentations 3:22). Come, taste and see that the Lord is good.

Taste and see that the Lord is good; blessed is the one who takes refuge in him. Psalm 34:8

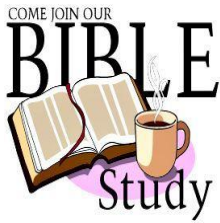

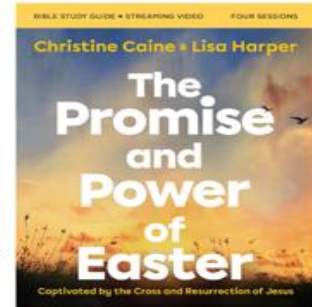

Mentoring for Newly Weds

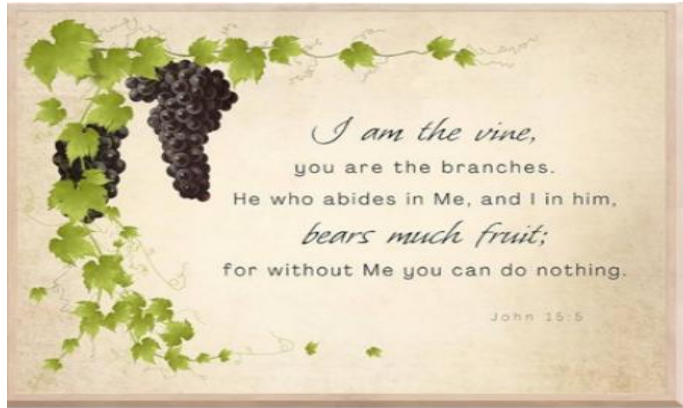

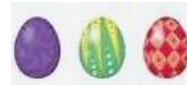
