"O God, why have you completely rejected us? Why are you so angry with the ones you care for? Remember the people you rescued long ago, the tribe you chose for your very own. Think of Mount Zion, your home; walk over to the temple left in ruins forever by those who hate us. Your enemies roared like lions in your holy temple, and they have placed their banners there. It looks like a forest chopped to pieces. They used axes and hatchets to smash the carvings. They burned down your temple and badly disgraced it. They said to themselves, 'We'll crush them!' Then they burned every one of your meeting places all over the country. There are no more miracles and no more prophets. Who knows how long it will be like this? Our God, how much longer will our enemies sneer? Won't they ever stop insulting you? Why don't you punish them? Why are you holding back?" (Psalm 74:1-11)

Talk about snail mail! A woman vacationing in New Jersey wrote a postcard and mailed it to her mother in Pennsylvania. It arrived 37 years later, having fallen behind a post-office sorting machine, where it finally was discovered and sent on its way. I hope it didn't contain any really important information that might be time sensitive.

That story got me thinking about all the change we've experienced in our lifetime when it comes to how we view time. Today's culture and technology are increasingly focused on now. The downside to our instant society is that it fosters the illusion that anything and

everything should be ours, well, instantly.

Our impatience spills over into our spirituality. When problems aren't quickly resolved, we get angry with God or become depressed. Others may praise God for fixing their lives, but we wonder why God isn't now acting on our behalf. The people of Israel had this same feeling a few thousand years ago. Their frustration is voiced in the words of our verse from Psalm 74.

But the simple truth is that following Christ, growing in maturity, building character, resolving most problems, and building strong families and relationships - all take time. Let's work to slow down and let God work in our lives. Let's learn to take the longer view of time, remembering always that God's timing is perfect and often very different from ours. May God take our hand and help us to walk more slowly through life.

#### Soul Cleanse

Therefore, if anyone cleanses himself from these things, he will be a vessel for honor, sanctified, useful to the Master, prepared for every good work. 2 Timothy 2:21

Working at the Hanover Hospital for 35 years, simple hand washing has been ingrained in our brains as the single most important defense against fighting and spreading germs. If a simple bar (or dispenser) of soap can be that effective in killing germs and keeping us physically healthy, just think what a soul cleansing can do for our spiritual well-being.

Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean; wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow. Psalm 51:7

"Soap likely originated as a by-product of a long-ago cookout: meat, roasting over a fire; globs of fat, dripping into ashes. The result was a chemical reaction that created a slippery substance that turned out to be great at lifting dirt off skin and allowing it to be washed away." (Google search)
"Evidence exists of the production of soap-like materials in around 2800 BC in ancient Babylon." (Google search)

He saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, but according to his own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit. Titus 3:5

Soap is something we probably take for granted. Something we use every day and is readily available to us in either the form of a bar or body wash.

Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me. Psalm 51:10

The older generation made lye soap. It was used for bathing and washing clothes. It was also good for a case of poison ivy!

If I should wash myself with snow And cleanse my hands with lye...Job 9:30 Now a days, there are many varieties of soaps to choose from. One of them is made by the KIND soap company out of St. Louis, Missouri. Advertisements state, "Be KIND to your skin, Be KIND to the earth, and Be KIND to others." The soap was designed for sensitive skin. If we are kind to our bodies with the brand of soap that we use, how much more important is it to be kind to our souls?

I will sprinkle clean water on you, and you shall be clean from all your uncleannesses, and from all your idols I will cleanse you. Ezekiel 36:25

What doesn't feel better than a good shower to wash away the dirt after a hot day of working in the yard or some other outdoor activity or sport? After I spend most of the day mulching, I am sweaty, sticky, and grimy with black dirt all over my hands and under my fingernails. What a satisfying, luxurious feeling it is to stand under the warm flow of water lathered in soap, letting the steady stream wash away all the dirt from the day.

Since we have these promises, beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from every defilement of body and spirit, bringing holiness to completion in the fear of God. 2 Corinthians 7:1

A soul cleanse may not consist of soap and water, but it can be equally satisfying and purifying. Recently, we mourned the death of Jesus on Good Friday and celebrated the Resurrection of Christ on Easter Sunday. On that cross, Jesus died to save us from our sins. Because our sins were nailed to the cross with Him, our souls have been cleansed. We have been made righteous through Jesus. That is our new identity.

I will cleanse them from all the guilt of their sin against me, and I will

forgive all the guilt of their sin and rebellion against me. Jeremiah 33:8

The only thing we are required to do is believe in Jesus and the power of His Resurrection. When we confess our sins, we are forgiven. When we confess our sins, the slate is wiped clean. When we confess our sins, our souls are cleansed. We then go through a process of sterilization much like our hands do with soap and water.

That he might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word, Ephesians 5:26

After a thorough scrubbing, our hands are free of germs and bacteria. After a soulcleansing, we are free of sin. This purification decontaminates our soul from sin. By grace, we are clarified and sanctified. Jesus' death on the cross was the perfect atonement for our sins. The dirt has

been washed away. What doesn't feel better than a good soul cleansing to bring you back to God? Purged of sin. Ready to repent and begin anew.

"Wash yourselves, make yourselves clean; Remove the evil of your deeds from My sight. Cease to do evil...Isaiah 1:16

Confession is our armor against sin as soap is the armor for bacteria. Refinement begins when we hand our sins over to God, accept His forgiveness, and make a earnest attempt to do better.

If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. 1 John 1:9

He recommends a portfolio comprised of the following: 70% high quality bonds 10% US dividend stocks 5% International Bonds/High 5% International 3% Emerging Markets 7% Cash Average 5% return over 10 vears An all-bond portfolio would average 2.31% over 10 years His fee to manage the funds for the church would be 8/10 of 1% of invested fundsexcludes cash balance. Account would be opened with Charles Schwab, typically \$50,000 minimum balance to open. Committee is recommending to Consistory for approval to use Mr. Maula for investment services and opening an account with Charles Schwab. We would like to open the account with the minimum balance upon approval and when the CD at Cornerstone matures in August, move \$500,000-\$600,000 to the Charles Schwab account.

c. \$10,000 invested in Series I savings bond from the US Treasury—current interest rate of 7.12%. Must hold for a minimum 1 year, no penalty to withdraw after 5 years. If withdraw after 1 year but

before 5 years, penalty is 3 months interest. Can purchase \$10,000 per year.


